
# IB SCHOOLS AUSTRALASIA LEADERSHIP SYMPOSIUM 2025

Asking different questions of ourselves and Al

Many of us feel like we're preparing students for a world that is changing faster than we and our education systems can adapt. We find ourselves asking questions like, "how can we control AI?" and "what can't AI replace?". In this session, we'll discuss some different questions that we might ask to position ourselves as stewards of the core principles of an IB education, which might be exactly what is needed now and into the future. Let's consider together how shifting from control to agency, from efficiency to effectiveness, and from preservation to value might help us and our students thrive in an increasingly complex world.

Professor Danny Liu is a molecular biologist by training, programmer by night, researcher and faculty developer by day, and educator at heart. A multiple international and national teaching award winner, he works at the confluence of artificial intelligence, student engagement, and educational technology. A Professor of Educational Technologies at the University of Sydney, he co-chairs the University's Al in Education working group, and leads the Cogniti.aiinitiative that puts educators in the driver's seat of Al

Inquiry and explicit teaching in the PYP and beyond

discuss the ways in which inquirybased learning and teaching and teaching explicitly in literacy can co-exist in the PYP and other programmes. We will look at what research tells us; what the IB tells us and how state expectations on what we are to teach explicitly can be woven into our day to make for authentic learning experiences. We will hear about work currently underway with network chairs and the IB to develop Australian and New Zealand specific materials to support schools. There will be an opportunity to provide suggestions to enhance this ongoing work.

Kathy Saville has been an educator for more than 35 years and has South Australia, Western Australia and Victoria. She has taught at the early childhood, primary, secondary and tertiary levels. She worked in a three-campus IB World School in Melbourne for over 25 years where she held numerous campus and college roles in curriculum and professional learning that included PYP coordinator, deputy director of curriculum and teaching and learning leader.

As an IBEN educator for 20 years, she has been very fortunate to be involved in many IB programme developments. She is a lead educator, field representative, consultant, workshop leader, programme chair, programme leader, evaluation leader, authorisation trainer and IBEN trainer. She has been involved in curriculum and workshop development in the PYP. Kathy is currently facilitating work with network chairs in Australia and New Zealand to develop Australia and New Zealand specific resources to support understanding of inquiry and explicit teaching in IB World Schools. She is a passionate advocate for all that the PYP and IB have to offer.



Building a Whole-School Culture for Responsible Al Integration

Presented by Felicity Nagel

As Generative Artificial Intelligence (GenAI) becomes an increasingly powerful force in education, school leaders must navigate complex questions around policy, compliance, pedagogy and practice. This session will explore how leadership teams can build staff capacity, with a focus on developing clear policy frameworks, identifying teacher champions and supporting staff readiness.

The session will touch on the wider impact of GenAI on curriculum and assessment practices, including how schools are approaching academic integrity, navigating data privacy obligations and managing responsible use. Participants will be guided through reflection and discussion around strategic priorities, with space to begin shaping implementation approaches tailored to their own school context.

The session is designed to support educational leaders in taking their next steps toward meaningful and compliant GenAl adoption across their school community.

Felicity Nagel is an accomplished educator with extensive experience in teaching and technology integration, currently working as a senior secondary teacher and technology and innovation coach at Kardinia International College. She works alongside staff to integrate emerging technologies into teaching practice, with a focus on practical strategies that enhance student learning and build teacher confidence. Her coaching supports the adoption of tools such as artificial intelligence, personalised learning platforms, classroom gamification and virtual reality. Felicity has presented at both

national and international education conferences, sharing her work on professional learning, innovative pedagogy, and wholeschool approaches to change. She is committed to creating inclusive, future-focused learning environments that support both student engagement and staff development.
